This is being written with the type font Brush Script MT.

It's a bold and straightforward font, close to traditional cursive.

This is being written with the type font Lucinda Handwriting.

It's not quite cursive, but comes close to how people write today.

This is being written with the type font Segoe Script.

It's a mix of printed and cursive styles close to my own.
